If you are a new neighbor to Herron-Morton Place, you'll be the focus of our next neighborhood event, HMP's New Neighbor Party, to be held on Saturday, March 7, at a soon-to-be-determined location. □ Special crime prevention meeting set: All neighbors in and surrounding Herron-Morton Place are invited to a workshop with Crime Specialist Kevin Keatly, from 6 to 7 p.m. leading into our monthly Herron-Morton Place Association meeting (from 7 to 8:30 p.m.), Monday, March 2, at Joy of All Who Sorrow Church (on the corner of 16th and Delaware streets).

□ Sidewalk and Alley Repairs: There are *many* sidewalks and alleys in our neighborhood in great need of repair. We are compiling a list of all damaged Herron-Morton Place side-

walks and alleys (including pictures) for our City-County Council representatives. I'd like to have the final list to them by March 15. Please email me your pictures and complaints, including street and actual addresses the damage lies between.

□ Neighborhood recycling: A blue recycling bin has been placed on the northeast corner of the Herron High School parking lot, which neighbors are encouraged to utilize. The only items which should not be thrown into the bin are large cardboard boxes. Please make your recycling as compact as possible.

□ Dress clothes donations: Herron High School is accepting gently used formal wear (dresses, suits, tuxes, etc.) for their annual prom. In the spirit of recycling (and making room for new/better-fitting garments in your own closet), please bring your items to Herron High School's Main Office (on the north side of the building) between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. on any regular

School seeks tutors for two programs

HERRON HIGH SCHOOL IS SEEK- ing volunteers to assist with before- and after-school tutoring programs that include study tables for student athletes and a voluntary Peer Tutoring Program.

The Peer Tutoring Program runs Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 4:15 to 5:30 p.m. and Wednesday mornings from 8 to 9 a.m.

Principal Janet McNeal said the program has grown significantly. "At first, kids were nervous about getting help, but now it is pretty popular," especially right before exams," she said. The school is seeking volunteers to help with language arts, math, science and Latin tutoring in particular.

Another tutoring program, Study Tables, focuses on helping student athletes main-

tain their grade-point averages and eligibility for sports. Times vary, but are usually built around practice times and start 30 minutes after school is dismissed.

For those who would like to contribute but aren't available during study table or Peer Tutoring times, the school is also seeking volunteers to drop off healthy snacks for the students to eat before or during tutoring sessions. Many students currently make their way to McDonald's before tutoring begins.

"Bravo, you are well organized. Congratulations," Advisory Board member Jeanne Chandler said at the group's first

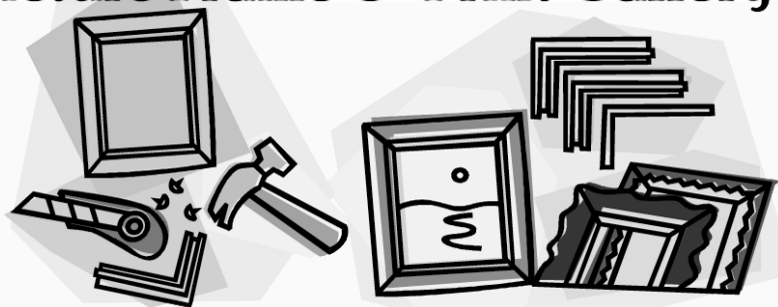
